Valuing sustainability while promoting MC's unique activities according to the times

MC conducts fair and sound business activities based on its corporate philosophy, the Three Corporate Principles, and for decades these principles have also inspired us to actively engage in social contribution activities. This year is a major milestone for MC as it will mark the 50th anniversary of the office to oversee social and environmental affairs, which was established in 1973 based on the strong determination and commitment of then-President Chujiro Fujino, who advocated that "Rather than allocating a portion of their profits to social contributions when profits are gained, companies should instead bear a certain amount of costs since they are a part of the societies and communities in which they do business in."

The global business environment is changing drastically, and amidst this turbulence, the scope of responsibilities companies have to society is becoming increasingly widespread. In addition to responding flexibly to such changes in the business environment, MC has consistently endeavored to fulfill its responsibilities to society. The spirit embodied in MC's Three Corporate Principles (namely, "Corporate Responsibility to Society," "Integrity and Fairness," and "Global Understanding Through Business") lives unchanged in the actions of MC's management and employees.

Our social contributions have repeatedly changed according to the times. Some of our

more recent initiatives include addressing the issue of child poverty in Japan in 2020, and rolling out a Natural Climate Solutions project in South Africa in 2022 with the aim of helping local communities and contributing to biodiversity conservation while simultaneously taking action against climate change.

On the other hand, there are many activities that we have consistently engaged in for many years, such as our "Friendship Camp for Mothers and Children," which is an activity designed for mothers and children of single-parent families, our Tropical Forest Regeneration Project, our Global Coral Reef Conservation Project, as well as providing support for para-athletes. Another feature of our social contribution activities is that when a natural disaster occurs in Japan or overseas, many of our employees volunteer to go to disaster-stricken areas to take part in restoration efforts while strengthening relations with local communities.

In this age of rapid change, social contribution activities need to adapt according to the needs of the times. We will continue to promote our social contributions while taking advantage of MC's unique characteristics in the hope of continuing to be a company that grows together with society by carefully identifying societal issues while valuing sustainability.

Philosophy Behind Our Social Contribution Activities

Doing What We Can for Society, Our Planet, and the Next Generation The idea of growing together with local and international communities in order to contribute to building truly prosperous, sustainable societies around the world is deeply rooted in the corporate culture of MC and anchored in the Three Corporate Principles, our company's guiding philosophy. It was 1973 when MC established an office to oversee social and environmental affairs based on an understanding that "As good corporate citizens, companies should actively carry out programs to contribute to society, and the expense of these programs should be borne as part of the social cost of doing business, before reaping any profits." Ever since then, we have been promoting self-driven social contribution activities as a means to contribute to the creation of a more abundant society.

The Three Corporate Principles



The Three Corporate Principles were formulated in 1934 as the action guidelines of Mitsubishi Trading Company (Mitsubishi Shoji Kaisha), based on the teachings of Koyata Iwasaki, the fourth president of Mitsubishi. Although Mitsubishi Trading Company ceased to exist as of 1947, the principles were adopted as MC's corporate philosophy, and this spirit lives on in the actions of today's management and employees.

Strive to enrich society, both materially and spiritually, while contributing towards the preservation of the global environment.

Integrity and Fairness

"Shoji Komei"

Origins of MC's Social Contributions

On July 19, 1973, MC president Chujiro Fujino delivered a speech at the World Trade Center in Tokyo, during which he underscored the importance of social contributions. Inspired by its leader's words, MC began its serious commitment to CSR that same year in October. Below is an excerpt from President Fujino's speech, addressing the origins and significance of MC's social contribution activities.

On "Corporate Responsibility"

Chujiro Fujino, former president of MC

In prosperous times we bear witness to major changes in values concerning the way people live, and at the same time, the strain caused by periods of economic growth add momentum to this, heralding the need for companies, particularly large corporations, to conduct a fundamental rethink of their stance toward social responsibility. Notably, a large corporation's reason for existing should not be judged by the size of its period profit or loss. Rather, the value of its existence should be judged on whether or not it has a structure flexible enough to adjust to changes in conditions based on long-term dynamism and a long-term view. Accordingly, a company should only be free to enjoy the profit it gains after first taking responsibility for the tangible and intangible social costs generated through its activities and providing services to society in its capacity as a corporation.

Going forward, I believe that each corporation ought to make public how it will bear the social costs of its endeavors as well as how it will establish an environment that does not oppress local residents or individuals by aligning with their freedoms.

In addition, since by definition a corporation can only exist through the pursuit of profit, it will not survive long if its manner of fulfilling social responsibility is merely to conduct charitable business. A corporation must be corporate-like in actively taking on projects in consideration of the breakeven point that are expected to be profitable over the long term if not the short term. It would be perfect if each project undertaken involved the development of information, technology or equipment that was in some way connected to the welfare of the people. (Partial excerpt)

Mitsubishi Corporation understands that an enterprise cannot continue to prosper without consideration for its environmental performance and will strive to protect and improve the global environment and pursue sustainable development through all aspects of its business activities.

As a responsible member of society, Mitsubishi Corporation will actively carry out philanthropic programs in an effort to promote the enrichment of society. Moreover, the company will support the efforts of its employees to contribute to society.

Three Overarching Themes of MC's Social Contribution Activities

MC focuses on social contribution activities in line with three overarching themes: "Realizing an Inclusive Society," "Empowering the Next Generation" and "Conserving the Environment." In addition, MC provides support for regions affected by natural disasters, including recovery efforts for the Great East Japan Earthquake. Our employees continue to actively participate in long-running programs that focus on contributing to the communities in which we operate on a global basis.

Realizing a Society Where All Children Can Make Their Dreams Come True

At Kidsdoor, we have been developing free study group programs around Tokyo and Miyagi Prefecture with the hope of realizing a society where all children can achieve their dreams regardless of the environment they were born into. In order to further expand this initiative, we have been collaborating with MC since 2020 to expand our know-how on providing academic support to children's support organizations all across Japan. By taking the learning support system that we have developed and implementing it on a nationwide scale, we believe that we will be able to produce many times more results that directly support children, and we are grateful for MC's understanding and support in this endeavor.



Friendship Camp for Mothers and Children

MC has been holding the Friendship Camp for Mothers and Children every year since 1974. The camp is for single mothers and their children and gives children the chance to interact with nature and make new friends. Mothers, meanwhile, enjoy playing with their child(ren) and get the opportunity to talk about their daily concerns with counselors and exchange information with other mothers. MC employee volunteers spend months planning and creating programs such as mountain walks, aquatic activities, and campfires. To this date, around 18,000 mothers and children and over 1,000 MC employees have participated in this camp.

Museum and Art Gallery Program

This program is regularly held in cooperation with museums and art galleries, offering people with impairments the opportunity to enjoy private exhibitions outside regular hours. Employee volunteers cooperate with museums and art galleries and provide support such as wheelchair assistance and giving directions. The program has been held since November 2005 at various institutions across Japan, including the Tokyo National Museum, the National Museum of Nature and Science, the National Museum of Modern Art, Tokyo, and the National Art Center, Tokyo.





Support for Economically Disadvantaged Children

MC has been supporting programs related to economically disadvantaged children in Japan since 2020. Through the Certified Nonprofit Corporation Nationwide Children's Cafeteria Support Center, Musubie, MC has been working to increase the number of children's cafeterias in Japan based on various surveys, measurements, and analyses by participating in a project that develops and measures indicators which capture the intricate value children's cafeterias provide. Similarly, through Certified NPO Kidsdoor, MC is also providing training support for organizations that want to assist the learning of children from poverty-stricken families by participating in a project that aims to disseminate know-how on providing learning support to children on a nationwide scale. Many MC employees participate as volunteers in these children's cafeterias and free study groups.

JEES-Mitsubishi Corporation Science Technology Student Scholarship

This scholarship was established in 2021 as a scholarship awarded by the Japan Educational Exchanges and Services (JEES) for graduate students (taking doctoral courses) in Japan, a demographic which MC has traditionally not provided assistance to.

Less and less students are studying science and technology in Japan, and as this has become a real issue in society, MC decided to conducted interviews with universities and other institutions. The aim of this scholarship is to contribute to the development of science and technology talent in Japan by encouraging graduate students (taking doctoral courses), who have traditionally had few support systems to rely on, to go on to doctoral programs by eliminating some of their financial concerns.

At present, the scholarship supports around 10 graduate students a year.

Hopes as Leader of Sustainability Transformation

Conservation International has enjoyed 14 years of partnerships with MC. What started as an NGO advisory relationship, has evolved most recently into a South African Rangelands project. MC has always been steadfast in their desire to address carbon and climate change and has worked hard to move the needle on

finding alignment internally – a colossal task considering the breadth of their business. Going forward, the sustainability challenge is much larger than any single company, so we hope to see MC emerge as the visionary leader for all industries in the Sustainability Transformation for Japan.

Sharing Scientific Wisdom to Give Hope for the Future

Environmental conservation and regeneration require scientific data, evidence, and the cooperation of many people who understand them. In addition to identifying what causes coral bleaching and coral survival strategies amidst global warming, this project accepts volunteers from both within and outside MC and shares the results of its initiatives through participation in survey and research activities to deepen people's understanding of coral reef conservation. What our world needs now is a solution to the issue of how to face important issues related to

daily life, such as climate change, biodiversity, and carbon neutrality, and to jointly develop opportunities to connect them to specific action guidelines. Coral reef conservation initiatives are a good opportunity to think about these kinds of issues, and I am confident that MC's continued support will further solidify such activities in the future.



Natural Climate Solutions (NCS)

There are various methods of employing Natural Climate Solutions (NCS) that utilize the power of nature, but MC focuses on methods that prevent the CO₂ stored in soil and plants from being released into the atmosphere while maintaining the amount of CO₂ absorbed by plants by protecting grazing lands and forests. Near Durban in South Africa, MC is working with the environmental NGO Conservation International to conserve grazing land in cooperation with local communities. At the same time, MC also aims to improve the quality of livestock farming, raise the living standards of local residents through water resource conservation efforts, and contribute to the conservation of biodiversity.

Global Coral Reef Conservation Project

This project, which started in Okinawa in 2005, is led by Professor Yoshimi Suzuki of Shizuoka University to ascertain the causes and mechanisms of the coral bleaching phenomenon, maintain the health of coral reefs, and establish and disseminate bleaching recovery technologies. The project has also conducted programs to deepen people's understanding of environmental issues by participating in survey and research activities. In 2012, a paper released by the Tropical Biosphere Research Center at the University of the Ryukyus, which identified the mechanism behind the coral bleaching phenomenon and the environment inside corals, received the "Best Paper Award" from the International Society for Reef Studies. The project is also supporting research on Australia's Great Barrier Reef to assess the impact seasonal changes, light, temperature and water quality have on corals.





Tropical Forest Regeneration Project

Tropical forests are said to be a treasure trove of biological species; however the shrinking of the world's tropical forests has had a major impact on biodiversity. Tropical forests act as carbon sinks that absorb CO₂, so reducing the area of these forests also affects global warming, abnormal weather, and natural disasters. Since the Tropical Forest Regeneration Project in Malaysia was rolled out in 1990, MC has been promoting forest development activities based on the concept of potential latent natural vegetation in Sarawak, Malaysia. The Malaysian project is based on research by Dr. Akira Miyawaki, professor at Yokohama National University when the project began. Its aim is to demonstrate the feasibility of restoring degraded forest land to conditions that closely resemble a natural forested ecosystem within 40 to 50 years, by the intensive mixed planting of native tree species. Approximately 300,000 saplings were planted on a 50-hectare experimental site, and some of those trees have grown in the past 30 years to be over 20 meters tall, confirming the strong regeneration of the tropical forest.

As a member of the communities in which we live and work, MC provides emergency support in the event of natural disasters and engages in recovery efforts in the affected areas according to their specific needs.

Following the Great East Japan Earthquake in 2011, then-President Ken Kobayashi rushed to the disaster zone where he witnessed with his own eyes the sheer scope of damage. He knew that MC had to do everything it could to help with the recovery, but he knew that whatever form MC's support would take, "it had to be swift, and it had to be sustainable." So, in the month following the disaster, Kobayashi decided to set up the Mitsubishi Corporation East Japan Earthquake Recovery Fund, which would deliver to the stricken region 10 billion yen in aid over a four-year period (an additional 3.5 billion yen was subsequently added in 2015). MC has provided a wide range of support in line with local needs, including but not limited to donations, emergency relief supplies, equipment, scholarships for students who find it difficult to attend school, subsidies for NPOs and other organizations working on recovery efforts, and dispatching MC employee volunteers to help with work on the front lines. In the spring of 2012, MC established the Mitsubishi Corporation Disaster Relief Foundation, and for about a decade, MC has been supporting industrial revitalization and job creation efforts to promote economic recovery in the disaster-stricken areas.

In addition, MC continues to carry out a wide range of disaster relief activities in areas affected by earthquakes and heavy rains around the world, such as providing recovery support in cooperation with local subsidiaries under the voluntary cooperation of many employees.

Great East Japan Earthquake Relief and Recovery Support Activities

MC conducts a variety of support activities in the areas affected by the Great East Japan Earthquake. Here are some of the activities MC has been working on over the past decade.

Employee Volunteer Activities

MC's volunteer activities in the regions affected by the Great East Japan Earthquake of March 2011 all began when employees started asking if they could actually go to the affected areas and help. Since April 2011, a total of 4,958 employees have participated in volunteer activities over a 10-year period, working hard to remove debris and mud. One participant commented from a disaster-stricken area by saying, "We are all encouraged by the fact that we are not alone."



Scholarships

In areas that were affected by the Great East Japan Earthquake, many students found it difficult to attend school due to losing their homes and/or their parents losing their jobs. Through these student scholarships, MC has encouraged such students to spread their wings and get involved in society. Scholarship benefits for all eligible persons were paid in full in fiscal 2019. Since fiscal 2011, a total of 4,907 students have received scholarships. Many of these students have continued their studies and made their dreams come true, and are now actively working as members of society.



Industrial Revitalization & Jobs Creation Support



In an aim to revitalize industries and create more jobs, MC granted loans to local ventures dedicated to rebuilding businesses or launching new ones. These loans were not handouts, meaning that they would eventually have to be paid back, but they provided just the right incentive to push the recipients to persevere with their business ventures. The recipients had up to ten years to get their businesses on track, until which time they were not responsible for making any principal or interest payments. Meanwhile, if these businesses generated dividends, the resulting funds would be paid forward to support further recovery efforts. MC also supported the affected regions by developing sales channels and providing marketing support.

Fukushima Winery Project





In 2015, the Mitsubishi Corporation Disaster Relief Foundation concluded a partnership agreement with Koriyama City in Fukushima Prefecture to start a project that offers support for the fruit farming industry in Koriyama City through an innovative, vertically integrated business model. The constructed winery facility is used by the Fukushima Ouse Winery to manufacture, process, and sell wine and liqueur made from fruit grown in Fukushima. In the spring of 2019, the winery unveiled a wine made from Koriyama grapes, and in the summer of that same year, the winery's apple liqueur took silver at an international wine judging competition. In the autumn of 2020, the winery's "Cidre 2018" received top honors at the largest competition in Asia. These achievements are just some examples of how the Fukushima Winery Project is working to promote the creation of products and brands that are rooted in the region.



The MCFA, which was jointly established by MC and Mitsubishi International Corporation in 1991, is a foundation that supports environmental causes throughout the Americas under the themes of biodiversity conservation, sustainable development, environmental education, and environmental justice.

Equitable Origin



Established in 2009, Equitable Origin's (EO)'s mission is to partner with business, communities and government to support transparent, equitable, and sustainable development of energy and natural resources. MCFA supported EO's efforts to conduct environmental and social impact assessments for natural resource projects in Mexico, with the goal of bringing certification to the energy industry. In 2023, close to 15% of natural gas production in North America is certified under Equitable Origin's EO100™ Standard. We also helped launch EO's CEFO Indigena, a web-based platform that aims to empower Indigenous communities to exercise their rights. Most recently, EO has focused on enhancing internet connectivity in remote communities to increase access to information, enable community-led environmental monitoring and prevent illegal deforestation in Mexico, Peru, and Ecuador.

Wildlife Conservation Society



Founded in 1895, Wildlife Conservation Society's (WCS)'s mission is to save wildlife and wild places, with a focus on conserving strongholds and leading with a science-driven model that is shaped and championed by communities. WCS engages 3.5 million people a year in its zoos and aquarium in New York City, inspiring visitors to care about nature. It has conservation operations in 50+ countries and has helped create or expand 245 protected areas. We have donated approximately \$3 million to WCS since 2003, including for the creation of the Bronx Riverwalk at the Bronx Zoo in New York City, the formation of Marine Protected Areas in Patagonia, and watershed conservation in Brazil and Peru through the Amazon Waters Initiative.

Yellowstone to Yukon



Founded in 1993, Yellowstone to Yukon's (Y2Y)'s mission is to connect and protect habitat from Yellowstone in the U.S. to Canada's Yukon Territory so people and nature can thrive. We have been funding Y2Y since 2018, supporting indigenous-led land conservation in line with Canada's commitment to protect 30% of land by 2030 by partnering with First Nations to restore a thriving caribou population in the Canadian Rockies where caribou are in decline. Y2Y recently supported a historic intergovernmental partnership agreement between First Nations, British Columbia, and the government of Canada to protect and recover caribou with the protection of more than two million acres in Canada's Peace Region.

Rainforest Alliance



Since 2017, the MCFEA has been supporting an international non-profit organization, Rainforest Alliance, which works with partners to protect forests, improve the livelihoods of farmers and forest communities, promote their human rights, and help them mitigate and adapt to the climate crisis. The organization aims to drive more sustainable agricultural production and responsible supply chains by certifying key agricultural commodities such as coffee, cocoa, tea and bananas and they have sustainable projects and/or certified farmers in around 70 countries. The MCFEA has supported their projects in Côte d'Ivoire and Kenya and the FY2023 project aims to help community forest associations and residents restore a sustainable and healthy landscape in the Mt. Kenya region.

Farm Africa



From FY2009 to FY2015 and continuously from FY2021, the MCFEA has been supporting Farm Africa, an international NGO with the mission of building a resilient rural Africa where people and the environment thrive. Specifically, they are working to reduce poverty by helping smallholder farmers in eastern Africa to regenerate their land, build climate-resilient businesses and grow more food. They promote a holistic approach that boosts yields, protects the environment and connects smallholder farmers to thriving markets. In FY2023, the MCFEA is supporting a project that aims to improve livelihoods through biodiversity conservation and support for local coffee farmers in the Bale-Eco region in Ethiopia. This project supports farmers to promote coffee production and agroforestry techniques and provides post-harvest management and coffee marketing training.

African Leadership Academy



Since FY2022, the MCFEA has been supporting the African Leadership Academy, an educational institution for students aged between 16-19 years old, which seeks to transform Africa by developing a network of young leaders who will address Africa's greatest challenges. The MCFEA's donation in FY2023 is supporting both their scholarship programme and their Design & Innovation Challenge, which encourages the students in the ALA network to study and propose solutions to tackle urgent challenges faced by the corporate sector. This year, MC staff members based in Africa are mentoring the students to come up with solutions to tackle climate related issues, and specifically how to maximize carbon storage in the soil while considering factors such as yield, nutrition, and biodiversity.

MCFEA

Mitsubishi Corporation Fund for Europe and Africa

Established in 1992 by MC and its UK-based subsidiary, the MCFEA supports a variety of partners operating in Europe and Africa in line with its central aims of promoting environmental conservation, supporting environmental education and research, and alleviating poverty.




